

# Advent: The Light has Come

# Life Group Material Hope in the Darkness w/b 30<sup>th</sup> November 2025

(Feel free to choose questions as appropriate for your group)

#### **Starter:**

- 1. On a scale of 1-10, what do you think the level of hope is at the moment
  - a. in the world at large?
  - b. in the Church?
  - c. in your own life?
- 2. What gives people hope do you think?

## Read Isaiah 9:1-7

Isaiah wrote during a period of fear, political turmoil, and spiritual confusion. The northern tribes (Zebulun & Naphtali) were hit hardest by the Assyrian Empire. The people lived under foreign oppression, corrupt leadership, spiritual confusion and fear of the future. Into this context, Isaiah speaks a message of hope, light, and the promise of a Messianic King.

- 1. What strikes you/ jumps out at you from these verses today?
- **2.** Verses 1-2. What forms of "darkness" do you see both in Isaiah's time and today?
- 3. Where have you seen God bring light into the darkness?
- 4. Verses 3-5. Why would these verses be like light in the darkness for the original hearers and why might they be for us?

- 5. What might be some examples of the 'yoke that burdens' us today?
- 6. Verses 6-7. Here is the announcement of the birth of a new king. In what way do these verses about a Messianic king fit with who we know Jesus to be?
- 7. Why are these verses reason for hope
  - a. In Isaiah's time?
  - b. For you personally?
  - c. For the world politically?
- 8. Which title for the Messianic king speaks most to you at the moment? Why?

## **Questions to finish with:**

- 9. How can we hold onto the hope we have in Christ, especially in dark times?
- 10. How might we be bringers of hope to those around us (and also not get burnt out in the process)?

As a group, you might like to light a candle and spend some time waiting on God, meditating on the hope God brings in Christ. You might like to listen to or sing an advent hymn, e.g., *O Come, O Come, Emmanuel* or *Come, Thou long expected Jesus*.
