

Theme Overview

Icebreaker

Look back on this series. Have you changed at all? What has God most been speaking to you about through it?

Bible Reflection

Read the following passages: **1 Peter 1:13–25; Ezekiel 36:25–27**

1 Peter 1 calls us to be holy as God is holy — rooted in grace, not guilt. Ezekiel 36 reminds us that holiness is Spirit-powered, not self-produced.

Discussion Questions

1. How would you define holiness in your own words?
2. What do you think it means for us to 'be holy as God is holy' (1 Peter 1:16)?
3. How do we go about seeking to be holy? What do these passages suggest?
4. How does Christ's death for us and the message of God's grace encourage us to be holy (1 Peter 1: 18-21)?
5. In what area of life do you sense God calling you to greater Christlikeness?
6. How can holiness become attractive to others rather than intimidating?

Practical Application

Prayerfully take some time in silence...

- Ask the Holy Spirit to highlight one habit, attitude, or relationship He wants to refine.
- Ask God 'what one thing do you want me to do, to play my part in this refining process?'
- Ask God 'what fruit of the spirit or 'grace' do I need God to give me to help me in this?'
- Commit to pray for that grace or fruit every day in the next week and seek to do the thing you sense him call you to do.

Prayer Focus

Pray together for a deeper hunger for holiness and purity — not out of duty but love. Ask God to give each member a soft, responsive heart.

Midweek Challenge

Read 1 Peter 1:13–25 three times this week and journal one new insight each time.
