At the start of 2025 we sensed God calling us to a year of 'courageously sowing seeds' and this annual review describes some of those new seeds we have sown over the last 12 months. It has been exciting to see a new St Mary's life group birthed; Walkies, Wellbeing and Worship meeting every Wednesday morning on the hills; the Youth Bible study at Abbey Road bringing together around 30 teenagers from across our town; Churches Together hosting HOPE25 in Priory Park in June and a very joyful 'Carols on Malvern Rise' on our new housing estate.

We give thanks for these and all the different ministries through which we have served our congregations and our town this last year.

Nationally, there has been much talk of revival in 2025 where God seems to be on the move in a new and special way, particularly amongst young adults, and we have seen our own evidence of this new spiritual awakening here in Malvern. We have had a good number of new people connect up and make their home with us, and encouragingly, several have come to faith during 2025. A very special Pentecost baptism service at St Andrew's was certainly one of the highlights of the year.

There have been some changes amongst our staff team, with Neil joining us as Operations Manager in January and Nathan moving on from the Youth Ministry Leader role and Tristan taking over that role temporarily, before he becomes our curate in 2026. We are very grateful for all that Nathan contributed to the youth and we are currently praying that God will provide the right person now to lead our important youth ministry into the next season.

As we look forward to 2026, we sense a call to particularly 'strengthen our teams' across our churches in this next season, and we continue to explore exciting ways to reach out to those who we are not yet reaching with the good news of Jesus.

Thank you all for supporting in so many ways over this last year. I continually tell people what amazing congregation members we have in the Chase Team and every person and every contribution is greatly valued. It is a huge privilege to minister among you all and Alice and I want to express our heartfelt thanks for all your support for us. We look forward to what God is going to do in 2026!

'THE SIX' @ ST ANDREW'S

This year, services of 'Worship and Waiting' have become deeply embedded in the programme of The Six. All of these times have been deeply significant as we have dwelt in the Lord's presence and waited on God. We have found the Holy Spirit working in profound ways among us to draw us into deeper fellowship with Him and with one another.



The number of services of Holy Communion has also increased this year – again, to enable us to sit in wonder together as we focus on the cross of Jesus, remembering His sacrifice for us.

In terms of Bible teaching we have followed the same plan as most of the other congregations in the Chase Team: 'Journeying with Jesus', 'Looking through the Cross' (Lent), 'The Holy Spirit' (Pentecost), 'The Sermon on the Mount', 'Great Verses of the Bible', 'Prayer', 'The Book of Jonah' and messages of 'Hope', 'Peace' and 'Joy' in Advent. These have been set in the context of the regular sung worship, testimony, corporate prayer and prayer ministry.

At the beginning of August we had an inspiring and challenging update from CAP (Christians Against Poverty) who operate locally in Malvern and Ledbury.

On 5 October the LICC roadshow came with their message of 'Empowering Christians to Make a Difference in Daily Life' which inspired many. A large number of people attended from other Malvern churches, which was very encouraging. In November we had a special service with Prayer for Healing when many were touched by the presence of the Lord.

A big thank you to so many who have carried this service during 2025. It is a privilege to be part of such a committed and loving team who serve the congregation of The Six so faithfully.

ALL SAINTS

We have seen a steady increase in attendance at our 10am service on Sundays over the year; people attracted by our style which is a mature mix of contemporary and traditional. Our services are both reflective and engaging, with Holy Communion every Sunday except 2nd Sundays. We offer a contrast to other forms of worship in the Chase Team, making use of a wide variety of liturgical materials and different preachers.

Second Sundays are non-eucharistic and a little more experimental, and in 2025 we had a Taize/Celtic Service, a Healing Service, a Harvest Praise Service and a Carol Praise Service. We begin each of our services with 5 minutes of silence, sometimes accompanied by quiet music, and this sets the atmosphere of holy contemplation that makes our worship so special.

MIDWEEK SERVICE

The midweek service takes place at 11am on Thursdays, and is well attended, with numbers sometimes exceeding 30. It is usually a communion service, and we appreciate Dave Bruce, Emily Spencer, David Ritchie or Mark Slater officiating. We have followed each sermon series and grown through them, both in richer worship and understanding, and in deeper commitment to 24/7 discipleship. We offer prayer ministry, and there is a strong sense of friendship, fellowship and mutual support among the members, which is reinforced over coffee in the foyer after the service, and through our occasional Bring and Share lunches. We are indebted to Sylvia Knott, who gives expert tech support, is the Warden-in-Charge for this service and organises the rotas for greeting/coffee, reading and prayers.

St Mary's is a church that loves to sing. The worship continues to be enhanced by pianists from all three churches who are greatly appreciated. This year, the 'St Mary's Singers' were established, a new iteration of a longstanding choir tradition at St Mary's. Since forming, the group has sung in services, at the Family Fun Day, at the Refresh Community Café and in a local Care Home at Christmas. The group sings together on a Wednesday evening with both children and adults taking part, drawing in people who may not otherwise connect with church services.

ONLINE SERVICES, TECH AND STREAMING

Throughout the year we have produced two online services each week, plus various other events and recordings. These are all available through our YouTube Channel (www.youtube.com/@ChaseTeamMalvern) with over 330 subscribers from countries around the world.

The live streamed services each week were:

- All Saints 10:00 Sunday morning services, including Holy Communion.
- St Andrew's 10:30 Sunday morning contemporary services.

Through the year, we normally live stream about 3 hours of online content each week, attracting over a hundred and fifty weekly viewings and regular positive, grateful feedback. That equals over 13,000 viewings totalling 3,300 hours watching time (often by groups of people) per year.

Thank you to all those who have helped make this possible this year.

Almost every service or event we stage requires technical support (normally sound and visuals) with an additional person required if we are streaming or recording. We have a brilliant and dedicated team but we are always in need of more volunteers. It's a great skill to have and a great way to serve. **Could God be calling you to serve? Full training provided.**

EASTER

LIFE GROUPS

We end 2025 with 15 Life Groups across the Chase Team involving around 150 people – a mixture of day time and evening groups with some meeting in local homes and others in our church buildings. In 2025, a new St Mary's Life Group was established and three other groups came to an end, having met their originally intended purpose. In 2025 three meetings were held over the year for leaders which included input and space for mutual support. Group material is provided centrally, accompanying the sermon series, and many groups make use of that with others opting to do something different. Examples of material in 2025 included the following series: Journeying with Jesus, Looking through the Cross, and Jonah: the mystery of God's mercy. Life Groups are a really vital part of the Chase Team, where so much pastoral support and discipleship happens. Thank you to the leaders of the Life Groups and to all who participate in a group.

DISCIPLESHIP COURSES

The Bible Course

This 8-week course, held in June and July and attended by 8-15 people, followed the Bible Society Bible Course, which takes people through a Genesis to Revelation overview of the Bible with teaching videos that include Bible teaching, on site filming, expert interviews and personal testimonies. The weekly sessions had a great atmosphere with both mature believers and new Christians actively participating in the discussions. Participants were enthusiastic about how the overview was helping them understand the scriptures better and most people were managing to keep up with the daily readings.

Foundation Stones

Foundation Stones was held in the autumn and covered a series of foundational truths for living the Christian life. Each session is self-contained and designed to be accessible for new believers as well as those who have been walking with God longer. The sessions have a mix of group discussion, group interaction and teaching. We welcomed 11 participants, who were enthusiastically engaged.

EARLY BIRDS

Early Birds is a short, friendly and informal service for families with young children which meets on the first, third and fifth Sundays of the month in the hall at St Andrew's. We enjoy singing, acting out Bible stories, making a reminder craft and listening to a short 'thought' for the grown-ups. More families have joined us over the year and there is a real sense of community as we grow in faith, journeying together, and enjoying fellowship over coffee and biscuits! It is a joy to see the children 'Jumping for God' (our first song every week) taking part playing the different Bible characters and growing in confidence, to see the care they take in making their crafts and their delight as they play together after the service.

TODDLERS

An increasing number of families appreciate the warm, safe space we provide mid-week for pre-school children and carers. The children enjoy a wide range of creative and construction activities provided; the adults make new connections and share experiences. At snack/circle time we model calmer behaviour as we enjoy songs and stories together. Generally, the St Andrew's' story reflects the Sunday Groups' theme. YOUTH MINISTRY

CHAOS

COMMUNITY FRIDGE

PCC

SAFEGUARDING

The PCCs have fulfilled their duty to comply with the House of Bishops' Safeguarding Policy and Practice Guidance.

During 2024, 38 members of the three churches have completed DBS checks and 134 safeguarding training courses have been completed at various levels. The number is high because there is a new requirement for people in many roles to complete 'Raising awareness of Domestic Abuse' training.

A few safeguarding concerns have arisen during the year, which have been addressed promptly by Dave Bruce, Emily Spencer and ourselves. Support and advice have been sought from the Diocese.

The parishes are now compliant with all Church of England requirements. All required documents and procedures are in place and good practice is being implemented.

TREASURERS' REPORTS

ALL SAINTS

In 2025, All Saints income was slightly higher than budget driven by a small increase in giving for which we are very grateful. Expenditure was much higher than budget driven largely by the cost of having the roof timbers and rainwater goods painted. The PCC had set aside £10,000 towards this work from reserves but in the end paid nearly £18,000 towards it. Utility bills were also significantly higher than budget, probably due to the increased use of the church and Megan's Kitchen in particular.

ST MARY'S

2025 saw total unrestricted income increase by 10% over 2024, with large increases in planned giving and hall income more than compensating for declining income from investments. Overall, having budgeted for a deficit of nearly £10,000, our extra income and day-to-day management of expenditure - including continued willingness of volunteers to take on roles we had budgeted to pay for - meant that we virtually broke even for the year. Another incredible result!

Our restricted funds supporting the Community Fridge, Refresh Café, Children's Holiday Club, St Mary's Toddlers and Tuesday Lunch Club were once again well supported by grants and donations meaning that the valuable work in these areas could continue. Once again we feel truly blessed to be going into 2026 in a good financial position.

ST ANDREW'S

During 2025 we received £307,743 from all sources (£295,520 in 2024 - representing a small increase of 4% year on year). We spent £328,409 (£314,784 in 2024 - an increase of 4%). Overall, this means that our total fund balances at the end of 2025 were 8.7% lower than at the start of the year (following a reduction also of 7.4% in 2024).

At the end of the year we held around £218,000 in all funds related to St Andrew's church of which just over £37,000 was held in restricted funds (whose use must be limited to the purposes these sums were raised or given to us).

Our largest costs in the year were staffing (just under £130,000 in total, including pension costs - £108,500 in 2024 - a 20% increase year on year) and the Ministry Share payment to the Diocese (£101,100 paid in 2025 v £100,000 in 2024 representing a 1.1% increase) - paid in support of the salary and some of the other costs of our clergy and of other Diocesan costs and mission work. This (again - as we have for many years now) represented the full ask of St Andrew's for this cost from the Diocese £20,255 was given away to support God's work beyond our immediate parish activities. This represents 10.7% of our voluntary (unrestricted) income. A further £18,421 was given away to support more local mission we are involved with in and around Malvern. The direct (non-staff) funding of our children and youth work rose considerably in the year to £6,409 - a rise of nearly 86% year on year.

On behalf of the PCC, I very much want to express my thanks for your very significant giving to God's work at St Andrew's Church again this year. We are very aware of what sacrificial giving this is for many and do our very best to make sure these funds are managed and spent to the greatest effect. I also thank those who have taken up the offer to switch their giving to the Parish Giving Scheme (PGS) over this year as part of our attempts to minimise the cost and effort involved in managing our income.

I want to offer thanks again to Marion Robbins, St Andrew's bookkeeper. She does the bulk of the finances work week by week. I get the easy bits! We would value others getting involved in the finance team of the church if anyone would be interested and feels they have a suitable aptitude for this way of serving God.
